against the broader society. However, this does not mean there is nothing here for Christians to learn! What warnings in this passage do you need to take to heart?

Read 1 Timothy 6:6–10 and 6:17–19. How does this parallel what James says?

Ask God to help you have a biblical attitude toward riches: Take time to think about the ways you can use what you have to bless others.

Friday

Read Isaiah 58:1–11. How does this parallel what James 2 says?

It's interesting to me that Isaiah does not say "Spend your money on behalf of the poor"; he says "spend yourself". What's the difference?

What are you doing to "spend yourself on behalf of the poor"?

Ask God to help us become a church known for the kind of heart God seeks in this chapter!

Saturday

Today read James 2:1–13 again. Ask God to help you apply these verses this weekend as you see people at church! Please pray for our services, and for the annual meeting after church on Sunday. Pray that God will be glorified! Thanks!

Our problem: Christians who don't live like Christ!

If you give special attention and a good seat to the rich person, but you say to the poor one, "You can stand over there, or else sit on the floor" — well, **doesn't this discrimination show that your judgments are guided by evil motives?**" *James 2:2—4 (NLT)*

Tuesday

Read James 2:5-13. It's so easy to justify our lifestyles by comparing ourselves to the worst people and insisting, "Well, I'm no murderer!" But what does James say about this line of thinking?

James is getting to the problem of subtle sin, sins that are less obvious than murder or adultery. In what areas of subtle sin do you struggle — perhaps areas like prejudice, lack of compassion, pride, etc.?

Ask God to help you see those subtle sins in yourself clearly, yet without heaping unproductive shame on yourself. Instead go to God, asking for forgiveness and power to overcome these areas of immaturity.

Wednesday

Read 1 Samuel 16:6–7. This describes the prophet Samuel's selection of the next king of Israel. What does God tell Samuel? How does this parallel what James says in chapter 2?

What are some of the various ways does our society judges people this way?

How does this pressure our young people, and even adults, to focus on achievements and values that are relatively unimportant to God and His work?

Today pray for young people you know: Pray that they will be able to treasure true maturity and wisdom and not the false, unfulfilling, external values our culture emphasizes.

Thursday

Read James 5:1-6. This is a challenging passage, especially in our culture! Note: Most commentators believe this is the one passage of James where he is not addressing Christians, but proclaiming a prophetic "woe" statement
