Monday

Read James 5:7–11. Why is it difficult to be patient?

James uses farming as a key example of patience. Why?

Ask God for supernatural patience — specifically, name the area about which you seem to get impatient about the most!

Tuesday

Read James 5:12. Why do you think, in the middle of a passage on patience, James talks about swearing?!

Read Matthew 5:33–37 for Jesus' perspective on the same issue. Do you have a problem with talking too much when you need to be waiting quietly and confidently?

Ask God for help in this area! Thank Him for His grace toward you. And please pray for the important Easter services this weekend: That many would take steps toward a deeper relationship with Jesus.

Wednesday

Read James 5:13–20. What has really tried your patience or your faith? How has prayer helped?

James talks about prayer not just in private, but in groups (verse 16) and with the leaders of the church (verse 14). Why is it a good idea to tell others and the church leaders what you need prayer about?

Have you ever been healed in some way after being prayed for? What happened?

Do you know of others who have?

Why doesn't this happen in every instance?

Thank God for the certainty of His appearing! Relax in the fact that He is in control—and patient! And again, please pray for this weekend's message and music in the Easter services to be celebratory and powerful. Thanks!

Thursday

Read over as much as you can of the book of James today. What are the major themes you have noticed as we've done this study of James over the past eight weeks?

James can polarize people. How do you feel after studying this book?

James would not be impressed that we have [studied his letter: the first thing he would say to us today would undoubtably be: "Are you applying it?" How can you be a doer of the truth you have heard in James?

Ask God to help you truly obey what you've learned from this wonderful little book! Please bathe the Easter services in prayer.
