Tuesday

Read Prov. 21:1, Rom. 13:1 & Col. 1:16. List what these verses tell you about God's hand in government.

Recall what you learned about God's sovereignty earlier in our study of Romans. How does this relate to the verses you read today?

How does knowing that God has established the authorities give you comfort and hope?

Thank God today for His sovereign control. Thank Him for His love and care for you. Ask Him to help you trust Him more today.

Wednesday

Read Matthew 22:15-22. What does Jesus' response teach us about our relationship to the government?

Respect for police

In what areas is it difficult for you to practice this principle?

How did Jesus practice this principle even during his trial before his crucifixion?

Pray for the civil authorities over you today, from the local to the national level. Pray that they will govern ethically and diligently. Pray for their spiritual strength as well.

Thursday

The basic Scriptural principle of church and state seems to be clear: Civil authorities are to be obeyed unless they are in opposition to divine law. In that case, Christians are encouraged to practice respectful but firm civil disobedience. Read Daniel 3.

In what way did they disobey?

How were they respectful even in their disobedience?

How is this an example for us?

When is civil disobedience justified for a Christian? (See Acts 4:18-20)

Thank God today for the blessing of a government where Christianity can be freely practiced. Pray for those in persecuted countries.

Read 1 Tim. 2:4-6. Who does Paul say we should pray for?

What reasons does he give for this?
