

# Part 2: **Surviving Tough Times**

As Jeremiah witnessed the sudden destruction of his city in 586 B.C., he kept a journal-- the Book of Lamentations. It shows how to find hope in tough times.

Lam. 3:1- "I am the man who has seen affliction..."

# Jeremiah's experience with despair:

- Loss of spiritual life "...when I cry for help, he shuts out my prayer." v. 2a, 8
- Loss of mental sharpness "... I walk in darkness, not light." v. 2b
- Loss of health "He has made my skin and my flesh grow old and has broken my bones." v.
- Broken heart "He pierced my heart with arrows..." v. 13
- Loss of hope and vision

- Loss of dignity, loneliness "I became the laughingstock of all my people; they mock me in song all day." v. 14
- Bitterness "He has filled me with bitter herbs..." v.
- Loss of prosperity "I have been deprived of peace: I have forgotten what prosperity is." v. 17
- Loss of strength "My strength has perished..." v. 18 NASB

"My strength has perished and so has my hope from the LORD." v. 18 NASB

# **Daily Meditations**

#### Monday

Has there ever been a time in your life when you felt distant from God? What happened?

Read Lamentations 3:1-33. What parts of this passage do you identify with?

Look back over the outline from this weekend's message. Which of the four points are difficult for you to put into practice?

Which are easiest?

Bring to God your struggles right now. Pray for others who are struggling. Thank God for His promise of comfort and sustenance.

#### Tuesday

In Lamentations chapter four, we see these characteristics of calamity.

- Sense of surprise
- "The kings of the earth did not believe, nor did any of the world's people, that enemies and foes could enter the gates of Jerusalem." Lam. 4:12
- Sense of overwhelming helplessness
- "...from our towers we watched for a nation that could not save us... Our end was near, our days were numbered, for our end had come..." Lam. 4:17
- · Sense of being exposed
- "Men stalked us at every step, so we could not walk in our streets... Our pursuers were swifter than eagles in the sky." Lam. 4:18
- Sense of being beyond comfort
- "Our eyes failed, looking in vain for help..." Lam. 4:17

Has there ever been a time you felt these symptoms of despair? When?

What helped you?

How would you counsel someone in tough times and despair?

Ask God to help you stay sensitive to those going through tough times. If you're experiencing these symptoms today, talk to the Lord-- and a Christian brother or sister-- about them.

#### Wednesday

Look over the bullet points on page one of this weekend's notes-- the symptoms of Jeremiah's despair. Check any symptoms you may be experiencing right now.

Now read through Jeremiah 3:19-13 again. Where did Jeremiah find hope?

How is this helpful to you?

Bring to the Lord your struggles. Purposefully bring to mind the facts of the Lord's compassions and mercies. Thank God that you are forgiven and will be redeemed.

#### **Thursday**

Sin has consequences: That is one theme of Lamentations, as well as the book of Jeremiah. Many of the tragedies recorded in these books were a direct result of rejection of God. While tough times are not always a direct result of sin (they weren't for Job, as we saw last week), sin does frequently lead to tough times. Read Lamentations 1:18-22. Why do you suppose we continue to sin even though we've been warned of the likely undesirable consequences?

What sin has a grip on you these days?

What are the undesirable consequences which could result from indulgence?

Bring to the Lord your struggle with specific sin today. Bring to mind, as Jeremiah does, that the mercies of God never fail-- they are new every morning! Thank Him for his forgiveness and mercy toward you even as you ask His strength in resisting temptation.

## Friday

Read Isaiah 61:1-3. Isaiah, about 200 years before Jeremiah, wrote this passage during a similar time of exile and stress for Israel. But this classic passage brought comfort. Then in Luke 4:16-21, Jesus reads this very passage and says he has come to fulfill it! How did Jesus fulfill these words of Isaiah for His followers then and now?

How has Jesus fulfilled Isaiah's words in your life?

Thank the Lord for His kindnesses to you! Dwell on how He has accomplished the truth of this verse in your life!
