Monday

Read Luke 2:6-20. The city of Bethlehem was apparently extremely crowded -- certainly a newborn baby could have been heard by many of the inn's guests -- and yet nobody came to see except shepherds from out of town. Why do you think the innkeeper and his guests missed this first Christmas?

Do people today miss Christmas for the same reasons? Do you?

Read Luke 10:38-42. How can you apply this Scripture to your Christmas celebration?

What can you simplify this year to spend more time contemplating the Christ of Christmas?

Ask God to help you focus on Him this season! Ask Him for wisdom to know what activities to trim back.

Tuesday

Read Matthew 2:1-3. Why was Herod afraid?

Are there people today who don't accept Christ for the same reasons?

Read Revelation 19:16. This is a description of a vision of Jesus. What name does he bear in this vision?

Why are people willing to accept Jesus as a great teacher, or religious leader, but not as king, or lord, over their lives?

Ask Jesus to be the one true Ruler over everything in your life. Give your will, your heart, your thoughts, your life, completely over to Him as your gracious King!

Wednesday

Read Matt. 2:4-6. The religious leaders and the people of Jerusalem were very devoted to their faith. They even knew by heart the Scriptures prophesying the Messiah! Yet they themselves didn't personally go and see this baby. When he grew to be man, most of them rejected him. How can deep devotion to religious ritual and actually blind some people to the truth about Jesus?

Has this ever happened to you? Explain.

How can familiarity actually dull our sense of joy and discovery at Christmastime, as it did for these religious leaders?

Were you familiar with the claims of Christ while growing up in the church, but somehow found them boring? Do you know of anyone for whom this is the case? If so, why?

How can you prevent this from happening to your own family?

Ask God to help you see past any religious traditions that may hide the truth of Christ.

Thursday

Read Luke 1:26-38. What can we learn from Mary's response in verse 38?

How is this different from our common response to unexpected difficulties and surprises?

Read also Luke 2:1-19. What can we learn from Mary's response to all this in verse 19?

How can we better treasure the little unexpected moments of Christmas this year?

Today, notice some "treasurable" moments.

Ask the Lord to help you appreciate the beauties and joys of life; to treasure the moments God sends you today!

Friday

Read Luke 2:8-20 & 1Cor. 1:27-31. The shepherds are outcasts. They were looked down on and shunned by society, yet God chose to reveal the birth of Jesus to these people! What do you learn about God from this?

What impresses you most about the shepherds and their response to the news of Christ's birth?

What application can you make to your own life?

Thank God today that He doesn't judge you by how you look on the outside but by what is in your heart. Ask God to help you respond as the shepherds did and "spread the word" – perhaps by inviting others to the Christmas musical at church this weekend!

Saturday Review
