Nehemiah 5:1-13

The Problem: Five Complaints in Nehemiah 5

1.	(vs. 1–3)
	"Now the men and their wives raised a great outcry against their Jewish brothers. Some were saying 'We and our sons and daughters are numerous. In order for us to eat and stay alive we must get grain . We are mortgaging our fields, our vineyards and our homes to get grain during the famine
2.	(vs. 3)
	"We are mortgaging our fields, our vineyards and our homes"
3.	(vs. 4)
	"Still others were saying, 'We've had to borrow money'"
4.	(vs. 4,5)
	" to pay the king's taxes on our fields and vineyards."
5.	(vs. 5)
	"Although we are the same flesh and blood as our countrymen, and though our sons are as good as theirs, yet we have to subject our sons and daughters to slavery . Some of our daughters have already been enslaved but we are powerless because our fields and vineyards belong to others."

The principle being violated:

"If one of your countrymen becomes **poor** and is unable to support himself among you, help him as you would an alien or a temporary resident, so he can continue to live among you. **Do not take interest** of any kind from him, but fear your God..." *Leviticus* 25:35-36

And fourth, find a way to make your commitment public to someone or some group.

Thank God today for His love for you and His concern for every area of your life!

Wednesday

Please reread Nehemiah 5:1-13, and also read Matthew 5:13-16. In what way were the people compromising in the Nehemiah passage? How about the church of Laodicea?

What does the Matthew passage say about compromise and the importance of being distinct in the world?

As you look at compromise in these passages and compromises you've made in the past, how would you describe the road to compromise?

As you go to prayer this morning talk honestly to God about areas of compromise in your own life. In what area do you see yourself on that road? Ask God to point you to area(s) of your life that do not reflect His way for you. Ask Him for courage to look honestly at your life and then make course corrections.

Pray that your heart will grow sensitive to choices you make that reflect compromise and not God's best.
