Tuesday

One point of this weekend's message was that God uses problems to correct me. Read Hebrews 12:5-11. List three truths about God's discipline from these verses:

What is God's goal in disciplining you?

Why should you not lose heart when that happens?

Think back on Bill Dallas' faith story from this past weekend. What does this tell you about one possible result of problems in life? How have you seen this in your life?

Thank God today for loving you enough to discipline you through consequences and troubles. Ask Him to help you avoid the practices that bring about harmful consequences for you and those around you.

Wednesday

One point of this weekend's message was that problems redirect me. How have you experienced this in your life?

Read 2 Corinthians 1:8-9. What good effect does Paul say his problems had?

How have you seen this to be true in your life?

Really, problems always redirect me - sometimes to different opportunities, and sometimes to a renewed focus on God. As Bill Wilson says, they point me away from trust in my resource and back to a trust in my Source.

Bring to God the problem with which you are struggling today. Ask Him to show you how you are to be redirected through this issue – perhaps to another opportunity, or perhaps to a deeper focus on Him.

Thursday

Read Romans 5:1-11. We all face different problems in life; however, the biggest problem we have is that we are all sinners in need of a savior. How is that problem solved, according to these verses?

One point of this weekend's message was that problems perfect me; that is, they help me grow. What do verses 3 and 4 tell you about the problems you face?

Recall a past problem. How did you see the progression of perseverance, character, and confident hope as you grew through your response to that issue?


