Daily Meditations

Monday

Tuesday

Please read Isaiah 40:1-2 & 61:7. What type of words does Isaiah use to describe God's heart for His people?

How does it encourage you to know that God's heart for you is described with words like "comfort" and "tender"?

In what way are you struggling with guilt? Read Romans 3:21–24. What do these verses teach about your standing with God?

How can you apply this truth to your struggle with guilt?

Thank God today for His amazing grace and mercy. Thank Him for His heart towards you. Pray that your actions will reflect the truth of God's comfort and tenderness towards you. Pray that you will grow in your trust of God's heart.

Wednesday

Please read Isaiah 40:6–8. How would you define your perspective on life?

What do these verses tell you about what you can count on?

How could this perspective impact your priorities?

Thank God today that His word stands forever. Thank Him for the opportunity to study the Bible. Pray that you will grow to have His perspective on life — that though it is fleeting there is opportunity to invest your life in something that will stand forever — God's word.

Thursday

Please read Isaiah 6:1, 40:18–22. We have spent a lot of time over the last month talking about the immensity of our God, but it's an important thing to have the right perspective on!

We are all tempted to compare God to something or someone, to fill voids we feel in our lives with something. Who/What are you tempted to compare God to?

How does Isaiah describe God in these passages? How does it encourage you to read Isaiah's perspective of God?

Thank God today that He is incomparable and all-powerful. Thank Him for true description of Him in the Bible. Pray that you will remember the immensity of God and that your faith will be refreshed and reenergized by who He is.

Friday

Please read Isaiah 40:30-31. In what way do you feel "tired and weary" right now?

According to these verses how does God strengthen you?

How could receiving strength from God reenergize your faith?

Thank God today that His strength never runs out. Thank Him for His care for you. Pray about the ways you feel tired and weary. Ask God to help you relax in His care and strength and trust Him to give you exactly what you need.
