Daily Meditations

Monday

Read the verses that come just before the verse we studied this weekend: Colossians 1:24–27. These are hard to understand, but remember the context: Paul's writing from prison. The Colossians may think their false teachers, not imprisoned and prosperous, have God's approval. Do people today sometimes equate a Christian leader's prosperity with God's approval of his ministry?

To counter that idea, Paul says he rejoices that he gets to suffer because of his ministry. After all, he reasons, Jesus also suffered. How is this different from most attitudes about suffering trials?

Thank God for those ministers who suffer because of their position. Pray for the pastors imprisoned all around the world. Ask God to help you see your own sufferings in a new light.

Tuesday

Reread Colossians 1:26–28. In a way, he means Jesus is the great surprise "plot twist" to God's dealings with humanity. How is this so?

Paul says he only preaches Christ, not extra religious secrets and requirements. What "extras" might preachers be tempted to add to this simple message?

How might you complicate the message?

Pray that you — and the whole church — will maintain a simple and pure devotion to Christ.

Wednesday

Read Colossians 1:28–29. Paul says his goal is to present everyone (a word he emphasizes three times in one sentence) mature in Christ. What implications do these two words — "everyone" and "mature" — have for our church?

Read Colossians 3 for a sketch of what it looks like to be mature in Christ. Where do you need to mature?

Ask God to help you mature in Christ, and to help you to help others!

Thursday

Read Colossians 4:5–6. How can we be wiser in the way we act toward outsiders?

How can you better make the most of "every opportunity"? What are some opportunities you may have in the next two weeks to invite people to Easter services?

What do you think it means to have your speech be "full of grace, seasoned with salt"?

Pray that God will open your eyes to opportunities to share Christ!
